English 132- Short Story and Novel

This course is an introduction to reading, understanding, and analyzing long and short fiction. Students will acquire a broad understanding of the art of fiction by exploring the elements of fiction such as plot, character, narrative voice, structure, and pattern in order to understand how and what a text means. We will consider the relationship between form and content, structure and meaning by looking at class, race, gender, nationality, sexuality, and identity as categories of analysis.

Student participation is essential to the development of competency in analyzing these literacy works, thus students are expected to be prepared for class by completing the reading prior to class discussion, and further to participate in class orally. **This is a demanding course. Reading is a must!**

CLASS PROCEDURES

- 1. Attendance is very necessary! If you cannot attend class for some reason, you are responsible for finding out from a classmate what you have missed, and what the assignment is for the next class meeting. Please do not call or email me for assignments you have missed. You are expected to be prepared to participate fully in the class discussion on the day you return to class, and to hand in any assignment that is due. Quizzes cannot be made up. After two unexcused absentees you will lose a point time each time you are absent. There are no exceptions!
- 2. **Class Participation** will be an important portion of your grade, not that it will be equivalent in value to all of the written work and discussion. I will assume that each of you would have read the assignment, and I will, therefore, feel free to call on you. You will bring to class in writing two questions to prompt discussion of the reading or one full paragraph must be on that day's reading. Questions must be worded in complete sentences. I will take up the questions from time to time.
- 3. To further prepare yourself for class discussion, **mark what you read by underlining passages, or by writing the page and paragraph number down** so that you can easily refer to materials. What I mean by that is material that strikes you as important or

interesting, or part of the text that you simply do not understand. This is the time to raise questions as well.
