American Literature and American Studies, West Virginia University

Undergraduate:

ENGL 154/254: African American Literature: Survey of African American literature from its beginnings to the present.

ENGL 241: American Literature I: American Literature survey from its beginnings to 1865.

ENGL 242: American Literature II: American Literature survey from 1865 to the present with an emphasis on the transformation of the literary marketplace by persons and peoples previously excluded from it.

ENGL 258: Popular American Culture: Examines popular culture from theoretical, historical, and practical perspectives, and provides an overview of traditions, forms, genres, and texts distinctive to American popular culture.

ENGL 337: Study of a Major Author—William Faulkner: Advanced undergraduate course that examines the life and work of William Faulkner during the most prolific period of his artistic career.

ENGL 337: Study of a Major Author—Ralph Ellison: Advanced undergraduate course that traces the career of Ralph Waldo Ellison and examines his influence in the twenty-first century.

ENGL 346: American Literature 1800-1865: Advanced undergraduate survey of antebellum and Civil War American fiction, drama, and poetry that revolves around online research in nineteenth-century literary magazines.

ENGL 347: American Literature 1865-1915: Advanced undergraduate course that examines the cultural politics of Reconstruction, the Gilded Age, and the Progressive Era through the lens of American literature.

ENGL 348: 20th Century American Literature: Advanced undergraduate survey of Twentieth Century fiction, drama, and poetry.

ENGL 349: Contemporary American Literature: Advanced undergraduate course exploring the major genres, authors, themes, and topics of American literature from 1960 to the present.

ENGL 384: Introduction to American Studies: Advanced undergraduate course that teaches the fundamentals of cultural studies and examines how these fundamentals form the foundation of contemporary American Studies scholarship.

ENGL 496: Senior Thesis – Capstone: Capstone experience for English majors in Literary and Cultural Studies.
