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Required Texts:

The Norton Anthology of British Literature. Vol. 2. Ed. 8.

Course Description:

This course will examine British literature from the late 18th century to the present. We will read a selection of essay, plays, excerpts from novels, and poems in order to understand the rich tradition of British literature and culture that leads to British identity today. We will begin with enlightenment and romanticism and move to industrialization, colonization, WWI, WWII, and multiculturalism. Major themes will include: history, philosophy, art, travel, war, identity, gender, and diversity.

Attendance:

If you miss 3 or more days of class, your final grade will go down one letter. Missing 5 or more constitutes grounds for failure. If you need to miss class, talk to me about it early. If you must be absent, it is your responsibility to check with a classmate to discover what you missed or inform me at least 2 class periods ahead of the date of your intended absence. Attendance is not just showing up for class. It includes *participation* in class discussions, in-class writings, quizzes, homework, and peer editing participation. In addition to regular class attendance, you will responsible for all assigned reading material. Much of class time will consist of discussions of material read; student input is necessary. Attendance is a part of your participation grade. Chronic lateness or tardiness will affect your grade.

Late Work:

Late work will result in an F for that grade. Beware: any work left in my mailbox or the English drop box may not be picked up on time and will be considered late. Work is due at the beginning of each class period on the day it is due.

Grading and Course Assignments:

We will write two tests and a paper in this class. The paper is worth 20 percent, the midterm 20 percent, and the final 30 percent. Every week you respond to the reading assignments; these are worth 20 percent. The remaining 10 percent is for attendance/participation, which includes free writes, -in class work, and participation in discussions.
