# ENGL 693G (Special Topics)—2 Summer 2020 Romanticism, Theoretically

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This course will attempt a miniature history of post-1945 literary theory through the lens of British Romanticism, as opposed to a survey of British Romanticism informed by literary theory. From Formalism to Ecocriticism and beyond, many of the key figures in the Anglo-American critical pantheon tested their mettle on Romantic texts, especially lyric poetry: we will explore possible reasons for this affinity, while engaging in close readings of what have become canonical texts. Some previous (undergraduate-level) exposure to the Romantic period will be helpful but is not required. **Students may take this course in lieu of ENGL 682 (Recent Literary Criticism).** 

# REQUIREMENTS

- Our class will meet by Zoom on **Mondays and Thursdays from 3:00-4:30 PM**. I expect you will be present for all meetings, but if you cannot, audio recordings will be posted to eCampus afterward.
- By **12 noon on the day of each session** (Monday and Thursday), I would like you to post one substantial comment about the readings for that session (approx. 100-150 words) to our class discussion board on eCampus.
- Each of you will be responsible for a brief (10- to 15-minute) report on one assigned theoretical text of the day. My major concern is as follows: **Based on the theorist's reading of Romantic literature, what principles of the corresponding theoretical school can we discern?** Signups will take place on a first-come, first-served basis and will open on the first day of class. You should post a 1-page handout to our eCampus discussion board no later than **9** AM on the day of your report; this will serve as a guide to your major findings and a provocation to further thought. When we meet live, you need not reprise the contents of your handout, but we will likely refer to it throughout our discussion.
- Your final project for this course will be a research paper, approx. 10 pp., preferably revisable as a conference presentation. As an alternative, you may submit a creative project or a public-humanities initiative of a comparable scope. A proposal (approx. 1-2 pp.) will be due on the Friday of Week 3; a rough draft is due on the Thursday of Week 6; we will workshop the drafts later that day; the final revision will be due that Sunday.
