WRIT 202: INTRO TO WRITING STUDIES

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DESCRIPTION

WRIT 202 is the gateway course for both the BA in Professional Writing and Editing and the BS in Scientific and Technical Writing.

This course will introduce you to writing as a field of study, and will help you explore what you want from the major considering the many scenes and places of writing we'll investigate during the course. I hope you will think of this course as a place where you will learn to ask questions about writing. For example:

- Why do we write what we write?
- How do we learn more about the nature of writing?
- How can writing be used to change our fields, our careers, and our communities?

By the end of WRIT 202, you will be able to define and illustrate writing processes as explained by researchers, theorists, and fellow writers; apply strategies for improving your writing in multiple genres and mediums; fesearch and explore issues of professionalization for writers.
