COURSE OBJECTIVES & EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Explore English literature of the Romantic, Victorian, Modern, and Postmodern periods.
- Gain an understanding of the major ideas, issues, and concerns of each of the four periods.
- Gain an understanding of how historical, social, philosophical, and cultural forces can determine the development of literature, and vice versa.
- Identify literary forms, styles, and conventions that were developed and used during each period.
- Develop an ability to independently interpret literary elements and connect them with literary periods, social movements, and political contexts.
- Gain experience in writing about literature and evaluating peer writing.
- Develop an awareness of how the literature of earlier periods still influences the creation of 21st-century texts.

CLASSROOM POLICIES

- Come Prepared: Bring your assigned reading materials, paper, and pencil or pen to class each day.
- Respect: Being a respectful student includes: coming to class on time; actively listening to discussions and peer comments; coming to class prepared to discuss all of the assigned readings; thoughtfully contributing to class discussions; bringing class materials with you; and practicing proper use of electronic devices.

OVERVIEW OF REQUIRED WORK

- Attendance: Attendance for this class is required. You are allowed six absences for the entire semester. Missing more than six classes will result in an F for the course.

This means I expect you to come to class having carefully read all of the assigned readings for the day. Finally, I expect you to be an active and respectful listener. This means taking lots of notes, staying awake, being respectful of each other's comments, showing a willingness to engage with other students during class discussions, and practicing appropriate use of technology (in other words, not texting or tweeting or taking awkward selfies during class).

- Quizzes (10%): I will periodically give reading quizzes at the beginning of class. Reading quizzes will not be announced in advance, and quizzes cannot be made up if you are absent on a day a quiz is given.
- Reading Response Papers (35%): You will write four reading responses for this class. I will distribute descriptions, writing guides, and grading rubrics for each response. Responses should be 2-3 pages in length (double spaced) and follow MLA formatting guidelines.
 - Late Responses: I expect you to turn in your work on time. If you are unable to make a deadline, contact me immediately.
- Exams (50%): You will take four exams during the semester, one per unit. Exams will be given during class. If you cannot attend class on an exam day, you must contact me at least 24 hours in advance to arrange a make-up exam time.
