### Overview

We'll investigate the major movements and genres of American literature from the 1820s through the Civil War, with more emphasis on longer full-length works than is typical in a survey. Selections will include the Anglo-American turn to history (Irving, Cooper, Sedgwick, Hawthorne) and native American responses (Cusick, Apess, Schoolcraft); the turn to nature (Emerson, Thoreau); the literature of slavery and abolition (Whittier, Douglass, Melville, Stowe, Jacobs) and other reform literature (Child, Fuller, Fern); the transformation of lyric poetry (Bryant, Schoolcraft, Poe, Whitman, Dickinson, Melville) and the persistence of epic (Longfellow); and the development of the novel (Melville, Stowe, Fern). We'll conclude by examining some literary responses to the Civil War (Whitman, Melville, Dickinson).

- A presentation, in which you take responsibility for giving some close readings and providing discussion questions for one class period. 5% of final grade.
- Two take-home essay exams, each 8-10 pp. double-spaced plus Works Cited page, documented using MLA style. Each 40% of final grade.
- A critical review essay, in which you synthesize and critique at least three recent articles
  or book chapters on an author or text of your choice from the syllabus. 4 pp. doublespaced plus Works Cited page, documented using MLA style. 15% of final grade.
