ENGL 405

Young Adult Literature

Course Description

The undergraduate catalog describes ENGL 405 as "a survey of young-adult literature with special attention to literary theories and methodologies that assist its interpretation," which broadly describes what we will be covering in this course. We'll also discuss the history of young-adult (YA) literature, and examine the ways in which authors, teachers, and critics imagine such literature functions.

As a writing intensive ("W") course, this class requires a significant amount of written work: 20 pages of polished writing, total, by the end of the semester, in addition to drafts and informal writing assignments. We will do peer review with these drafts, and you are always welcome to bring drafts to me to discuss as you revise them. Since this is a 400-level class, I will expect you to demonstrate your understanding of course content by incorporating research beyond the required course readings into the long paper. We'll talk about all of this more as the course gets underway.

Once we start the literature-circle work, I'll expect you to be available to meet online with your small group during our regular class meeting time, since that may be the only time when everyone in the group is available.

Otherwise, much of the work of the course will be asynchronous, meaning you'll need to manage your own time and keep up with the work as scheduled in our Google Classroom.

Course Requirements

Detailed information about the following assignments will be provided separately in Google Classroom, under the "Classwork" tab. Your final grade will be calculated as follows:

Paper 1 (reading autobiography)	15%
Paper 2 (long paper)	25%
Annotated bibliography	10%
Final project	10%
Drafts of papers 1 and 2, annotated bibliography, and final project	5%
Literature-circle work	10%
Commonplace book	25%

You'll see major due dates for both drafts and final versions of these assignments below. I'm willing to give you an extension on any assignment if you need one, but you need to email me before the deadline and give me a specific date and time when you plan to turn the assignment in. Assignments turned in late without having an approved extension will lose points.

Here's our tentative week-by-week plan. Given the general instability of...well, all the things right now, this is open to adjustment and change. This syllabus is a living document, and I'll update it as we go. Still, here's the basic overview. Week of August 26-28

We will meet via <u>Zoom</u> on both Wednesday 8/26 and Friday 8/28 at our scheduled class time, 10:30-11:20 am. We'll start with some introductions and basic information about the course, and then start thinking about kids' reading habits and preferences.

Week of August 31-September 4

We will meet via <u>Zoom</u> on both Monday 8/31 and Wednesday 9/2 at our scheduled class time, 10:30-11:20 am. We'll continue to discuss the history and evolution of YA as a genre, and we'll start reading Laurie Halse Anderson's *Speak*. **On Friday 9/4, the first installment of your commonplace book is due by 11:59 pm.**

We will meet via <u>Zoom</u> on Wednesday 9/9 at our scheduled class time, 10:30-11:20 am. We'll finish our discussion of Laurie Halse Anderson's *Speak*. Your first literature circle will be meeting for the second and third times this week, and on Friday 10/2, the third installment of your commonplace book is due by 11:59 pm.

Week of October 5-9

We'll meet via Zoom on Monday 10/5 to discuss Paper 2 and to organize the second literature circle groups. On Wednesday and Friday, your lit circle groups will meet, and on Friday 10/9, the proposal for your second paper is due by 11:59 pm.

Week of October 12-16

This week, your second lit circle group will meet, you'll be doing some preliminary research for your second paper, and the fourth installment of your commonplace book is due on Friday 10/16 by 11:59 pm.

Week of October 19-23

We'll meet as a whole class via <u>Zoom</u> on Monday 10/19 to talk more about paper 2 and the annotated bibliography, and to organize the <u>third round of literature circles</u>. Your litcircle groups will meet on Wednesday and Friday, and **the fifth installment of your commonplace book is due on Friday 10/23 by 11:59 pm.**

Your third lit circle group will meet once more this week, and we'll meet as a whole class via **Zoom** on Wednesday 10/28 to discuss paper 2 and to organize the **fourth literature** circles. The draft of your annotated bibliography (including your shared resources) is due by 11:59 pm on Friday 10/30.

For Monday's <u>Zoom</u> class, read <u>Nancy Garden's article</u> about the history of LGBTQ+ YA lit. We'll discuss it before you meet with your fourth lit circle for the first time. You'll meet with your fourth lit circles on Wednesday and Friday, and **the final draft of your annotated bibliography is due by 11:59 pm on Friday 11/6.**

Week of November 9-13

We'll meet as a whole class via Zoom on Monday 11/9 to discuss paper 2 and the responding process for the drafts. I'll start holding individual conferences on paper 2 drafts this week (sign up here), and the sixth installment of your commonplace book is due by 11:59 pm on Friday 11/13.

Week of November 16-20

The draft of your second paper is due by 11:59 pm on Monday 11/16, and you need to read and respond to two other people's drafts by the time class meets on Friday 11/20. You'll be meeting in your responding groups via Zoom on Friday. I'll also be continuing individual conferences with each of you about your second paper this week.

We'll meet as a whole class via **Zoom** on Monday 11/23 to discuss the final project, **and** the final draft of your second paper is due by 11:59pm on Tuesday 11/24.
